Installation and celebration of District Superintendent of Commonwealth East

"The United Methodist Church in New England gathered in joy and reverence to celebrate a significant and Spirit-filled milestone, the installation of Rev. Byungmoo "Moo" Lee as the new District Superintendent of the Commonwealth East District. The service of installation and worship, held at Beacon of Hope United Methodist Church in Framingham, Massachusetts, brought together clergy, laity, and friends from across the New England Conference for a sacred moment of transition, thanksgiving, and renewal.

"Presiding over the service was Bishop Thomas J. Bickerton, Resident Bishop of the New Hope Episcopal Area, joined by members of his cabinets from both the New York and New England Annual Conferences. The ceremony not only marked the beginning of Rev. Lee's new ministry but also affirmed the Conference's ongoing commitment to nurture faithful, compassionate, and visionary leadership for the transformation of the Church and world.

"The worship service was both reverent and celebratory, filled with songs of praise, heartfelt prayers, and a spirit of unity. In his sermon, titled "Crucified God," Rev. Lee invited the congregation to reflect deeply on the meaning of discipleship in a world yearning for compassion and justice. Drawing inspiration from Mark 8:27–38, he explored the cross not merely as a symbol of suffering but as a profound testament to God's unwavering solidarity with humanity. 'Our faith calls us not to look away but to embody Christ's compassion in action,' Rev. Lee proclaimed. He challenged those gathered to walk alongside all who suffer from war, hunger, and poverty, adding, 'Discipleship is not about avoiding the hard places, but about meeting God and one another in those very places where pain and hope coexist.'

"Following the sermon, Bishop Bickerton led the

congregation in Holy Communion, reminding all that 'the table of grace is both a place of nourishment and a call to mission.'

"Rev. Lee expressed deep gratitude to the Commonwealth East District Committee on Superintendency, Beacon of Hope United Methodist Church for its hospitality, and to all who had helped make the day a meaningful celebration. 'This moment is not mine alone,' he shared. 'It belongs to all of us who believe that God is doing something new in our midst.' Rev. Lee's journey to ministry is one of deep faith, perseverance, and calling. A native of South Korea, he came to the United States as a student and settled in the Boston area, where his spiritual life found new expression in the United Methodist Church. His faith was shaped by prayer, community, and study, culminating in his Master of Divinity degree from Boston University School of Theology, one of Methodism's most historic centers for theological learning. [He is] guided by a passion for interfaith understanding [and] is a bridge-builder who approaches ministry with empathy, humility, and intellectual depth.

"Ordained as an elder in 2011, Rev. Lee has faithfully served several congregations across the New England Annual Conference, most recently at Wesley United Methodist Church in Worcester, Massachusetts. Under his guidance, the church expanded its community ministries, deepened its worship life, and became a visible sign of God's love and justice in the city. Those who know Rev. Lee describe him as a thoughtful listener, compassionate pastor, and visionary leader. His approach to leadership combines theological depth with practical wisdom, always rooted in the conviction that the Church exists to embody Christ's love in tangible ways. 'Faith,' he once reflected, 'is the power that enables me to face the harsh realities of the world without fear, no matter how painful or hard they are.'

"In announcing his appointment, Bishop Bickerton praised Rev. Lee's spiritual maturity and innovative vision: 'Rev. Lee brings a passion for the Church, a sensitivity to multiculturalism, and a willingness to think beyond traditional boundaries about the future of ministry. He is deeply committed to helping our congregations thrive in faith and mission.'

"Throughout his ministry, Rev. Lee has woven together personal faith and social witness, insisting that spiritual growth must always lead to compassionate action. His preaching often returns to the question: *How are we, as the Church, reflecting the heart of Christ in the world?* He believes that authentic discipleship is lived out in the everyday acts of mercy, justice, and service that bring God's kingdom nearer to earth.

"For Rev. Lee, the path forward begins with humility and trust. 'The Church,' he affirms, 'exists not for itself, but for the world God loves. Our calling is to listen, to serve, to love — and to remember that Christ is always with us, even in the hardest seasons.'

"With compassion as his compass, faith as his foundation, and hope as his vision, Rev. Lee steps forward ready to serve, lead, and inspire the people of God in New England and beyond."

"... as the Rev. Abby Holcombe prepared to welcome protesters and others present that day to partake in Holy Communion, the United Methodist pastor noticed some in the crowd pointing behind her. So, she turned around. 'We're serving communion, and they walk out with gas masks,' said Holcombe, pastor of the West campus of the United Methodist (multi-site congregation) Urban Village Church.

"Just the day before, an Illinois judge blocked federal agents from using chemical irritants and other types of force to disperse crowds after agents outside the same facility repeatedly fired pepper balls at a praying Presbyterian pastor. As [the current administration in D.C.] has made moves to deploy armed National Guard troops to both Chicago and Portland, Oregon, United Methodists have stepped up to protect their neighbors, comfort the distressed, and bear witness to a more Christ-like way. They are following the well-worn path trod by fellow church members in Los Angeles and Washington, D.C. Both cities also have faced the administration's militarization and the accompanying onslaught of armed masked federal agents seizing suspected undocumented immigrants from the streets.

"Many United Methodists see standing up for immigrants as part of following Jesus' command to love their neighbors and, as part of living their baptismal vows, to "resist evil, injustice and oppression." Confronted with the cold calculations of ICE, these churchgoers — sometimes at personal risk — are bringing the warmth of their faith.

"'These deployments are acts of intimidation meant to instill fear. No one is safe from such tyranny, and no one is alone in facing it," said Bishop Cedrick Bridgeforth, who leads the Oregon-Idaho, Pacific Northwest and Alaska conferences. We will continue to work with our ecumenical and interfaith partners. We will not abandon those in need. We will show up, listen to those who have been silenced, and use our facilities to support partners doing work we cannot do alone.'

"The Northern Illinois Conference has established an Emergency Solidarity Fund to provide food and other essentials for immigrants now fearful of leaving their homes."

"Pet ministries unleash connections" "Pet-related ministries are needed, and are flourishing "

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. — Celebrating the connections people have with their pets and developing relationships with pet parents can lead to meaningful discipleship. A new book by Gayle Fiser and the Rev. Betsy Singleton Snyder, pastor at Pinnacle View United Methodist, offers "New Tricks" and practical advice for churches that want to build community with pet enthusiasts. At Resurrection, a United Methodist Church in Leawood, Kansas, a pet project has grown into full ministry.

"If we pay attention, [animals] can teach us a lot about God's love,' says Gayle

Fiser, a pet ministry veteran and United Methodist layperson. 'We always talk about unconditional love when we talk about our pets and how they model that for us.' [Pets bring] 'presence, mindfulness and loyalty...all those are right out of the Bible,' adds the Rev. Betsy Singleton Snyder, pastor at Pinnacle View United Methodist Church in Little Rock, Arkansas. She and Fiser are passionate animal lovers, and they collaboratively lead the church's thriving, multifaceted pet ministry.

"Celebrating the connections people have with pets and developing relationships with pet parents can lead to meaningful discipleship. 51% [of people] think of their pets as much a part of their family as a human member. Consider this alongside the worldwide declining birthrate and we'll see that, in the U.S., there are more pets in households than children."

"What this means for United Methodists is there is a ripe mission field awaiting response. Snyder says, "This is pastoral care, evangelism, hospitality, mission and service. It could even be considered a Fresh Expression." Fresh Expressions are creative ministries that focus on reaching people in new ways."

GLOBAL MINISTRIES COMMISSIONS EARTHKEEPERS FOR ENVIRONMENTAL STEWARDSHIP

"72 new Global Ministries EarthKeepers will launch creation care projects in the U.S."

"Global Ministries EarthKeepers is a training program to equip United Methodists in the United States for environmental stewardship. Participants discuss theology, United Methodist resources, community organizing and antiracism, and then use what they learn to develop an environmental project for their churches and communities.

The program supports people looking to turn an idea into action and those who want to deepen an existing ministry. Participants develop plans in conversation with their peers, troubleshooting ideas and sharing strategies. With 2025 trainings held online and in Des Moines, Washington, this group of EarthKeepers represents 24 annual conferences and all five jurisdictions. Participants include clergy, laity, annual conference staff and agency staff.

"The vital leadership of Global Ministries EarthKeepers is an alternative to the political, economic, and social forces that undermine the flourishing of God's creation,' said Roland Fernandes, general secretary of Global Ministries and General Board of Higher Education and Ministry. 'Their projects bring positive environmental impact and real hope to communities throughout the United States.' At a time when environmental programs in the United States, both secular and religious, are being defunded and closed, Global Ministries EarthKeepers is flourishing with vision and purpose," said the Rev. Jenny Phillips, director of Environmental Sustainability. 'More EarthKeepers have been trained in 2025 than in any other year in the program's nine-year history. Their projects are remarkably bold and ambitious, meeting the challenges of this moment.'

"... the EarthKeepers commissioning service has been held online, allowing EarthKeepers nationwide to participate along with their family, friends and church community. The service will be led by Bishop Cedrick Bridgeforth, resident bishop for the Greater Northwest Episcopal Area. 

Church leads way in affordable housing

"ARLINGTON, Va. — Central United Methodist Church in the Virginia Conference demolished its old building and has replaced the structure with 144 affordable-housing units, a day care and a new sanctuary. The new affordable housing is helping to address the D.C. area housing crisis. U.S. Sen. Mark Warner of Virginia is sponsoring legislation to make it easier for houses of worship to embark on such projects nationwide."


