



Vermont hit hard by floods

A note from the Green Mountain District Superintendent:

Thank you to all who have prayed, made special offerings, assembled UMCOR cleaning kits (once flood buckets), and extended efforts to assist after the recent flooding in the Green Mountain District.

We pray especially for the three United Methodist congregations whose church buildings sustained significant damage: Wolcott UMC, Wesley UMC in Waterbury, and Trinity UMC in Montpelier.

We also lift up the efforts being made to repair significant damage to MacKenzie House, the Central Vermont Mission house that is maintained so that groups like UM Volunteers-in-Mission have somewhere to stay when they come to help in times of need.

In addition, we pray for the ministries that are taking place in communities like Morrisville where for many days the public water system was contaminated and could not be used for any purpose. There are many communities who still need to boil water in order to drink it.

Because the damage caused by these floods is more severe overall, and in many specific communities, than those sustained during Tropical Storm Irene, we anticipate that there will be a long time of recovery. Homes, businesses, and farms were damaged and destroyed.

We will continue to communicate what support is needed as the work evolves. We anticipate needing UM Volunteers-In-Mission teams to help with restoration of damaged spaces in the coming weeks and months. We continue to hold each other in prayer and to be vigilant in extending gestures of care for one another. BE A SAVVY "GREEN" CUSTOMER:

"A whopping 83% of Americans are concerned about the environmental impact of products they buy (Business News Daily, Feb. 2023). A variety of business journals are reporting that consumers are willing to pay more for environmentally better products...but it is buyer beware! Some companies are exploiting this to get consumers to pay more for 'greenwashed' products. Greenwashing includes vague claims that products are green without the science to support the claim. Be wary of 'eco-friendly,' 'sustainable,' 'plantbased,' 'natural,' 'biodegradable,' and 'locally sourced.' Look for reliable green certifications from Rainforest Alliance Certified. Fair Trade Certified, Green Seal, or Forest Stewardship Council. Look for these well-regarded environmental certifications: Overall sustainability-B Corp Certification; Cradle to Cradle; Green America Business Network Certification: Appliances—Energy Star; Clothing—Global Organic Textile Standard; Ethical labor practices—Fair Trade USA; Food—USDA Organic Non-GMO Project; Paper products—Forest Stewardship Council. Keep in mind these cannot cover everything. Todd Larsen, Ex. Co-director for consumer and corporate engagement at Green America, says, 'You shouldn't assume a product is perfect, even when it has a good certification.' Also...research brands and buy from those you know are using good practices. If a cont'd. p. 5

(continued from page 2): product arrives in lots of excessive plastic or non-renewable packaging, that is a dead give-away. Truly renewable companies use recyclable envelopes and packaging." *Kim Hornung-March, New England Conference, United Methodist Church.*

A few days ago, a climate scientist named Mann appeared on a morning TV show and said there are things we can do to reach the goal of staying below 1.5°C further warming by 2050, a date mentioned by many scientists as a tipping point. Among the changes we need to make to reach "0" CO_2 emissions is to use less and less fossil fuels. Some of us, hopefully enough of us, will strive to keep our climate warming below the 1.5°C increase. I don't know about you, but I would like my grandchildren and generations following them to live in that "0" CO_2 emissions climate. (editor)

Eugene Linden, journalist and author of *Fire* and Flood and The Winds of Change, which won a Grantham Awards, says in The True Cost of Climate Change, **The Climate Book**:

"What might be the socio-economic cost of climate change? If we continue along our current path and the Earth warms by 3°C above preindustrial levels, the risk is, simply, the collapse of civilization itself. [It] will be a global calamity marked by financial collapse, mass starvation, mass migration and the descent of many nations into civil disorder, Had governments recognized the gravity of the risk in the early1990s, this apocalyptic prospect might have galvanized action to contain greenhouse gas emissions and avert potential catastrophe. Now, economics is catching up to reality, awakening to the fact that **acclimation to climate change**, not mitigation efforts, **poses the greatest threat to future prosperity.**

Scientists have been talking about tipping points for quite a while and, if crossed, we could see warming pass the "most pessimistic forecasts derived from climate models...melting of permafrost in the high north could release vast amounts of greenhouse gasses...fresh water flooding into the North Atlantic could shut down the global current

which keeps much of Europe warm." An exact date isn't known when tipping points may be crossed, but..."once crossed, they will be irreversible in any timeframe meaningful to humans."

"In 2021, Moody Analytics estimated that the global economic toll of 2°C of warming, would be \$69 trillion...Swiss Re estimated that 2.6°C of warming by 2050 would inflict three times more economic damage than the Covid-19 pandemic. Unlike the pandemic, however, the damage inflicted by warming will only grow worse every year. According to insurance giant Aon, the world suffered \$1.8 trillion in weather-related losses during the first decade of the new millennium...[during the 2010s] that number rose to \$3 trillion."

This money comes out of our pockets in rising insurance premiums, for instance, money we could use to help families in the CCCC Covenant to Care for Foster Families. "The message that should lodge with politicians and the public is that climate change must be averted at any price because its ultimate cost can be neither imagined nor calculated."



Holy Spirit Here and Now, by Trevor Hudson.

"From the moment the church got its start at Pentecost, all the way to the end of the Book of Acts, the Holy Spirit is at work. In the New Testament the Holy Spirit isn't simply one of the three persons of the Trinity. Like the Father and the Son, the Spirit is alive and at work, and the church folks like Peter, Stephen, and Paul knew the Spirit and saw the Spirit.

"Pick up one of the letters of the apostle Paul, First Corinthians, for example, and watch what happens: The Spirit works among the believers in the churches, convicting them, healing them, and promoting their growth. So much so that each one of those Christians received a gift, a skill if you like, a unique offering of each for the good of all in the church. The Spirit was equipping.

"This active Spirit we see in the New Testament is taken up anew by Trevor Hudson, one of South Africa's strong Christian leaders. He expresses the Spirit's work among us through active verbs like 'bringing us alive,' 'transforming us,' 'guiding us,' 'leading us into the desert,' and 'engaging us with suffering.'

"The only way to talk about the Spirit in a healthy, biblical way is to talk about what the Spirit is *doing* rather than what we believe about the Spirit or even how the Spirit relates to the Father and to the Son—**each important in its own sphere** of thinking. But first and foremost the Spirit is at work, pursuing activities, turning us around abruptly and slowly, and then changing you and me into the sort of people who look more and more like Christ so that we might all work together."


